

Haslam's Foundry Special Edition!

As plans are now emerging, and consultations open, for 75 Council Homes to be built on the site of Haslam's Foundry (Aida/Bliss factory), we've got announcements from both the council, and concerned residents.

The council turned down the Car Heritage proposal for the site (which is now happening in Sinfin https://www.greatnorthernclassics.co.uk/) with the petition of 500 names to reconsider this falling on deaf ears at the council. They have since discovered it's going to cost at least an extra £4 Million to develop the site for council housing so it's time to start finding out if they've made the right decision (especially as the spend has not yet been agreed by the council)!

Haslam's Foundry (Aida/Bliss Factory) - Derby Council Announcement

Derby City Council is planning to redevelop the site of the former Haslam's Foundry (Aida Engineering also known as Aida Bliss) on City Road to provide new affordable homes. The council are proposing a mixture of apartments, houses, commercial units and the creation of open space on the site.

This would be the biggest investment in new Council homes in Derby for over 40 years, so the council want to get it right. The plans are being shared so that local residents and anyone with an interest can comment on them, and help to improve them before a planning application is submitted.

WARNING: COMING SOON NEAR YOU YET MORE APARTMENT BLOCKS

Many of us will have read in the Derby Evening Telegraph that at long last the plans to develop the former Aida Bliss factory site were now available. (Reference DET article). Many local residents who have been concerned about the decaying state of the building were disappointed and even more concerned about what the council is proposing.



Overcrowding

A previous survey of local opinion indicated strong support for either family houses or small scale office type buildings. What is being proposed are 22 family houses and additional 53 one- and two-bed roomed flats contained in two four-storey and one three-storey block. A number of concerns have been expressed about this including:

- It means just too many people (an estimated 240 residents) on a small site and the impact on their quality of life
- The family houses have small living areas on upper storeys, small difficult to access gardens at ground level, poor natural light levels and three flights of stairs which could be challenging for family living.
- Buildings that restrict natural light because they are too close together
- The impact on parking, congestion and air quality of increased car ownership in the area.

Huge Extra Costs

In addition to these concerns the significant extra costs of building on this site arising from mitigation of flood risks and contamination amount to a huge extra £4 million. This amounts to an extra £50,000 per dwelling. Is this the best use of public money? Surely finding another site to build houses on would make more sense?

Building on flood plains

Despite the welcome installation of flood defences the site is still actually a flood plain and there have been plenty of instances of newly erected flood defences being over topped by flood water and nearby dwellings experiencing major flooding. There's a growing strong opinion amongst environmentalists that there should be no new residential buildings on flood plains.
